Top 10% Nationwide

Five times Havelock High School has been listed in US News and World Report as part of the Top 100 schools recognition.

Out of over 40,000 schools involved in the study, HHS was a top 10% school according to the criteria used in the study.



Block Scheduling

- *85-minute classes with an additional one period Seminar each day*
- *4 classes first semester*
- *4 new classes second semester*
- *Exams at end of each semester – 25% of class grade*
- *Students can earn 8 credits each year.*



Monday Focus

On Mondays there will be a thirty minute block between first and second period, in which all HHS students will complete a school-wide lesson that is intended to further prepare them for the ACT college entrance exam.

What is Seminar?

Seminar is an extra period built into the school day for students to get extra help in their classes.

Students return to their seminar period for an additional 30 minutes daily according to the schedule:

Monday – No seminar

Tuesday- 1st period

Wednesday- 2nd period

Thursday- 3rd period

Friday- 4th period



What Makes Seminar Unique?

During the first four weeks of the semester, every student attends Seminar.

After this four-week period, students are assigned to attend Seminar on a two-week cycle based upon their average in each class.

Students with a class average below 80 are required to attend the thirty minute Seminar.

Students with a class average of 80 or above are excused from Seminar. They may leave for the day if they walk or drive. Students who ride buses or who have after school activities will be supervised in the gym where they can study or socialize with other students.



Technology Fee

In order to protect the Craven County Board of Education investment in regard to technology, the BOE has decided to collect an annual technology fee of \$20.00 from each student. The collected funds will be used to repair and/or replace devices that are damaged or obsolete.

Students should pay the fee to their 2nd period teacher by September 15, 2015.

- *including English I, II, and III*
- *26 credits needed to graduate*

Athletic Participation Requirements

Driver's Education

- Must be 14 ½ years old*
- Driver Education is not taught during the school day.*
- 30 hours of classroom instruction*
- 12 hours of on-the-road instruction*
- “Driver Eligibility Certificate” is needed to receive a NC driver's permit or license.*
- Driver's permit or license revoked if student drops out of school or does not pass 3 out of 4 classes each semester – OR – 70% of your classes if you have a reduced schedule.*
- There is a \$45 charge due on the first day of class.*



Extra Curricular Activities



Code of Conduct

Students represent HHS when attending school and participating in extra curricular activities.

Students are expected to represent HHS in a manner that demonstrates good manners, respect, and pride.

Students should treat all visitors to our campus as guests.

Students are expected to follow all school rules at all times, including after school activities.



Attendance

Students who have more than 10 absences during a semester in a course will lose credit for that course. This includes excused absences and unexcused absences.



Tardy Policy

- First Tardy- Warning*
- Second Tardy- Warning*
- Third Tardy- Saturday detention*
- Sixth Tardy- Two days ISS*
- Ninth Tardy- One day OSS*
- Every third tardy after nine-One day OSS*



Tardy Policy

Students are required to be moving, not standing, in the hallways during class changes and before and after school.



Dress Code

- No head gear including hoods*
- No sunglasses*
- No sagging pants or visible undergarments*
- No sleeveless tops*
- No bare midriffs or sheer clothing*
- No revealing or tight fitting clothes*
- No facial piercings except in ears*
- Skirts and shorts must be at MID-THIGH*
- No sleepwear or bedroom shoes*
- No offensive or gang-related clothing*
- No holes in pants or shorts (this includes “fake” holes)*

Improperly dressed students will not be allowed to attend class, and Saturday detention will be assigned. No warnings will be issued.



Transportation

- Parents should only drop students off in the front parking lot.*
- Parking passes for students are \$60.00.*
- Students who ride the bus must abide by school and county policies.*
- Failure to behave on the bus may result in a loss of bus riding privileges.*



Use of Tobacco Products

- Tobacco products are forbidden on school campus 24 hours a day*
- Lighters and matches and other smoking paraphernalia are prohibited*
- Possession of tobacco products, e-cigarettes or smoking paraphernalia will result in fines:*
 - \$50 first offense*
 - \$100 second offense*



Cell Phones/ Electronic Devices

*Cell phones and other electronic devices
are not to be seen, heard or used from
7:20-2:30.*

- First Offense-Confiscation for 10 days*
- Second Offense- Confiscation for 30 days.*

This is a Craven County Board of Education policy.



Assigned Areas

*Student should not arrive prior to 7:00 A.M.
unless attending a supervised school activity.*

*All students wait in cafeteria or on the terrace
between 7:00 & 7:20 A. M.*

*All students must leave campus by 2:40 p.m.
unless attending learning centers or a
supervised school activity.*
